Traveling full-time in a caravan, the young family chases the sun, swims in the ocean as much as they can and loves to be salty, sandy and sun kissed. And they've found the perfect blend that allows them to live a life that, to them, is simply magic.

"Over the past five years we have worked as social media influencers working with brands and businesses creating photo and video content of our travels as well as sharing family travelling tips via our blog and social media pages," they said.

While Marli and Ziggy are yet to reach school age, Rob and Tracy won't necessarily stop their travels to pull their children into the mainstream system of education.

"We have no problem with the idea of home schooling the kids - so if we are still on the road after this 12-month lap we will look into distance education or home schooling," they said.

The community is very aware that the site is in the middle of the tourist hub close to the Forest Park children's playground, residential housing, St Joseph's Primary School and the

Preparation for the VCAT hearing in March

2018 is continuing.

We have started a new petition. It is available for signing at the Orbost Newsagency and this petition will be presented at VCAT. If you feel the location of the purposed daughter station is

wrong, please pop in and sign it.

Our members are preparing further information to present to VCAT. As Enwave has engaged a major legal firm to represent them at VCAT, we are keen to engage professional help to assist us in the presentation of our case to VCAT to overturn the East Gippsland Shire decision. This could be very costly.

People have asked how they can help. The Go Fund Me continues and has raised \$5520. The

VCAT application cost was \$836.20. We are accepting donations through Go Fund Me or donations can be made at the Orbost Newsagency. Receipts are available. Should any funds remain after the VCAT hearing, they will be donated back to the Orbost community.

We are organising a garage sale to be held on November 24 at 15 Clarke Street. Further details in next week's Snowy River Mail.
